CNSA ORGANIZATION CHART

BACKGROUND

The organizational model of CNSA is based on the belief that its real strength is found in the members. The organizational structures are in place to support and represent students wishing to become active and involved nationally in the student and nursing communities.

How the Model Works

CNSA consists of members who attend chapter schools. All nursing students enrolled at a chapter school are automatically associates (members) of the association. Individuals can benefit from and influence all levels of CNSA through their active participation. Students at member schools elect an Official Delegate (OD) for their chapter as their voting representative at the regional and national meetings; each chapter has one vote at meetings. Students at a chapter school may also elect one or more Associate Delegates (AD) to assist the OD. The AD may vote in the absence of, or with the permission of the OD. Delegates provide a functional base for each chapter on a regional and national level and are the individual students' main link to the broader organization. The delegates of each regional executive elect a regional director to represent the regional executive on the National Board of Directors each year at the National Assembly. Delegates of the National Assembly also elect the incoming Board of Directors and Committee Chairs at the National Assembly each year.

REGIONS

CNSA members are categorized into one of five regions based on their school's geographical location. Chapter members in each region elect an OD and AD to represent their school both regionally and nationally.

Chapter members in each region elect one person into the position of Regional Director; that person represents their region on the Board of Directors. This means that there are five (5) regional directors in total on the Board of Directors, one from each region. These regions are West (BC, Alberta, Yukon, and NWT), Prairie (Saskatchewan & Manitoba), Ontario, Quebec, and Atlantic (Maritime Provinces and Nunavut).

ROLE WITHIN CNSA AS AN OD/AD

Each role that students have within chapter schools plays an integral role in maintaining the functioning, continuity of information, and national voice of CNSA. The following is a list of the responsibilities of the Official Delegate and the Associate Delegate as per the goals outlined in the CNSA strategic plan.

The Official Delegate (OD)

Supporting Quality Nursing Education and Entry to Practice; and, Be a Trusted and Reliable Source of Information for Canadian Nursing Students

- Promote and encourage the participation of CNSA and CNSA related professional and social events.
- Orientate students to CNSA including the goals of the association and benefits of membership.
- Promote and encourage application to CNSA awards at their chapter school.
- Keep students informed about CNSA activities and encourage participation.
- Maintain a permanent chapter address and a file of CNSA business and information including correspondence and reports.
- Provide the regional director with an outline of the chapter goals and activities for the year and submit bi-monthly memo on the last day of the month (with the exception of the months May through August in which schools are closed for Spring/Summer terms) and notify the Regional Director of any change in contact information throughout the year.
- Maintain communication with the Faculties, Colleges, Schools of Nursing, and Regional Member School regarding chapter's activities.
- Vote on behalf of their chapter at Regional Executive and National Assembly meetings.
- Attend all business meetings of the regional and National Assembly meetings; if unable to attend, provide written regrets to the Regional Director.
- Present an oral and written report with recommendations at each business meeting of the region.
- Surrender to the incoming OD all records and files with an oral and written explanation and recommendations within fourteen (14) days of the end of the term of office.
- Work with Associate Delegate (AD) in prompting and carrying out the activities of the Association
- · Promote the CNSA awards within their chapter
- Distribute emails and updates from the Regional Director and Board of Directors to all members within their chapter.

ROLE WITHIN CNSA AS AN OD/AD (CONT'D)

- Vote for the Regional Achievement Award recipient on behalf of their chapter
- Consult members on their needs regarding services and information.
- Educate members on how to access services.
- Increase the profile of new and existing initiatives.
- Work with their school's administration to include CNSA fees into the school's registration costs
- Continue to develop and promote National nursing students' week on chapter school campuses.
- Communicate effectively and frequently with the Regional Director and other chapter schools in the region to maintain connections within CNSA.
- · Attend all business meetings of the Regional Executive and National Assembly

• Attendance is important and expected

• Collaborate with the Associate Delegate(s).

Advocate for the Increased Incorporation of Indigenous Health and Social Policies, as so I isted in the following actions, within Nursing context and profession

- Seek speakers and additional educational opportunities to provide an Indigenous perspective if your curriculum does not already do so.
- Start meetings with a Land Acknowledgment to remind Chapter Members that we are settlers on Indigenous land.

Promote Social Justice as it Relates to Gender, Sexuality, Anti- Oppression, and Anti-Racism

- Disseminate related information regarding current CNSA activities, positions, and resolution statements to students and faculty.
- Encourage chapter members to get involved on their campuses.
- Disseminate recommended eLearning or modules to extend nursing education into underrepresented patient populations.
- Keep CNSA Chapter Members aware of cultural safety, anti-oppression, antiracism, and anti-discrimination within meetings.

Support the Enactment of Measure that Improve Nursing Commitment to the Advancement of Climate Health in Nursing Practice

- Be conscious of Chapter activities and their impact on the environment. Opt for environmentally-friendly initiatives to reduce our footprint and do our part to remain sustainable in practice.
- Disseminate related information regarding CNSA activities, positions, and resolution statements to students and faculty
- Advocate for climate friendly initiatives within Chapter Schools. For example, volunteer clean-up, education regarding climate health, and reducing wastes during meetings.

ROLE WITHIN CNSA AS AN OD/AD (CONT'D)

The Associate Delegate (AD)

- · Assists the Official Delegate in the aforementioned duties.
- Acts as a proxy in the event of the OD's absence for voting purposes.
- Attend all business meetings of the Regional Executive and National Assembly.
- Act for the OD on occasions where the latter is unable to attend
- Promote CNSA and CNSA activities in their chapter along with the OD.

Within Your Region Communication

Communication between the Regional Director, Official Delegate, and Associate Delegate helps to ensure continuity of information and helps make a smooth transition between membership years. Communication within schools, between regional chapters, and at a national level helps to build a strong, united voice of nursing students. It is expected that the OD/AD of each member school:

- Provide contact information to the Regional Director each year with updates as necessary.
- Maintain an email account for the CNSA chapter at their school.
- Submit a monthly update to their Regional Executive highlighting chapter activities.
- Act as the communication link between CNSA and the general members with their chapters by distributing pertinent information.
- Disseminate a biannual report to their Regional Executive fourteen (14) days before the fall and winter regional meetings for presentation.

A problem or breakdown in communication is defined as:

- Failing to access the CNSA email account at least once a week.
- Not providing accurate contact information to the Regional Director.
- Not alerting one's Regional Director of changes to contact information
- Not disseminating a monthly update.
- Not responding to direct queries from your Regional Director or Regional Executive.

ROLE WITHIN CNSA AS AN OD/AD (CONT'D)

Regional Director may take the following actions if a communication problem exists:

- If no response from the chapter has been received within one week, the Regional Director will send another email.
- If there continues to be no response, the Regional Director will telephone the individual or contact them through their personal email address; and
- If there continues to be no response after a three (3) week period, the Regional Director may contact the head of the chapter members program to:
 - Work to re-establish a line of communication with the OD.
 - Identify whether the OD in question is still occupying the position.
 - Designate the AD to fulfill the position if the OD is no longer interested or able.
 - Facilitate the recruitment of a new OD, if the AD is no longer interested or able to fulfill the role.

The following actions may be taken by the OD/AD if communication problems occur with the Regional Director:

- If a Regional Director does not respond within two (2) weeks, the OD/AD may contact the President to re-establish lines of communication.
- If there continues to be no response after one (1) week, the President may proceed to strike a Board Mediation Committee and resolve the situation according to the Part XI of the Rules and Regulations

We ask that if any extenuating circumstances arise that causes you to be unable to maintain communication between yourself and your partners that you inform your Regional Director. In this circumstance, an "Automatic Response" should be set up within your email. If you require assistance with this, please contact your Regional Director.

BOD INFORMATION

The Board of Directors (BOD) comprises a couple of subgroups: Administrative Council (AC), other voting members, and non-voting members. The BOD is responsible for conducting the business of CNSA including setting association policy, appropriating, and allocating the funds of the association, and managing and distributing the awards of the association. The BOD meets officially three times a year in the spring, summer, and winter prior to the National Assembly.

MEMBERSHIP INFORMATION

The membership year runs from December 1st to November 31st. To renew your school's membership status, the fully completed membership package must be completed and submitted by December 1st. Completed membership packages must be received for a chapter to have voting privileges at the National Assembly, and access any of the membership benefits. Fee payment gives your chapter school official status as a member and allows CNSA to exist as a national organization; the ability for CNSA to function depends upon your chapter submitting their membership forms and fees on time.

Annual Membership Fees:

- \$11 for full-time students (Undergraduate, Diploma, Post-RN Students)
- \$7 for part-time students (Undergraduate, Diploma, Post-RN Students)
 - Membership fees <u>must be paid in one instalment</u> via cheque or money order made payable to: Canadian Nursing Students' Association.

Membership Package Includes:

- Membership Form (found on the CNSA website or through your Regional Director).
- An official letter from the Faculty of Nursing or Registrar, confirming the total number of full and part-time students the chapter is claiming.

- a. The CNSA offers students the opportunity to pursue a multitude of leadership roles, ranging from becoming an CNSA delegate that represents your school, joining one of the many committees or caucuses within the association, or running for a position on the CNSA board of directors.
- **b.** As the national voice of Canadian nursing students, the CNSA represents students in several Canadian nursing organizations, including the CNA, CFNU, CASN, CNF, etc. Through our partnerships with these organizations, CNSA members are able to participate in their meetings and sit on their board of directors, bringing student perspectives to the decision making table.
 - **i.** Running for certain positions on the CNSA board allows you to be the official student liaison for organizations:
- C. The CNSA represents nursing students to the government, and members of the CNSA board of directors routinely meet with elected officials such as provincial premiers and health ministers to communicate the needs of nursing students.
- **d.** The CNSA represents Canadian nursing students in international organizations such as the International Council of Nurses (ICN) or World Health Organization.
- **e.** We foster connections with other nursing student associations internationally (NSNA, ENSA, KNSA), and with other healthcare student associations within Canada (CFMS, CAPSI).

2. Advocacy

- **a.** Members are able to get involved in advocacy within the CNSA through:
 - i. Participating in our Advocacy Committee to discuss issues that matter to them, and then participate in actions that will raise public awareness and engage policymakers to ensure student concerns are being addressed.
 - **ii.** Submitting policy and resolution statements to be discussed and adopted at our yearly national assembly that occurs during the National Conference in January.
 - **iii.** Getting elected to positions on the board that allows you to represent the interest in nursing students in national nursing organizations such CFNU, CNA, CASN, CNF, etc.

COMMITTEE INFORMATION

CNSA Committees are a great opportunity to become involved in what you are most passionate about, to meet students from across the country and to develop leadership skills, so we encourage you to contact our committee chairs!

Administrative Council (AC)

The AC consists of the President, VP, and DOC. The President acts as the official spokesperson of the association, exercises general supervision over the interest and welfare of the association and chairs the EC, Board of Directors, and Board Mediation. The VP oversees the advancement of educational, research, and award activities within the association and acts for the President when the latter is unable to be present. The DOC manages the communication media of the association, including website and social media accounts, to ensure effective communication between the Board and our members as well as external communication with the public. The Administrative Officer is a non-voting member of the AC and maintains day- to-day operations of the association, including but not limited to the legal documentation of the association, maintenance of financial records, and coordinating BOD's meetings.

Our goal as an AC is to work closely and seek the guidance of the BOD to achieve the association's missions and visions. We support the BOD through reviewing, providing feedback to, and approving their work and contributions to the association. We work directly with our Administrative Officer to conduct the business of the association and its functions. Each AC member collaborates with one of our national partners (CASN and CFNU) and sits on their Board as a student representative with a voting right. This allows the AC to give insights from a student's perspective, to ensure students' voices are heard, and to influence decisions and actions on diverse pertinent issues in nursing. The EC addresses concerns brought forward by our members and provides support within the capacity of the association. 
Nominations and Elections Committee






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NATIONAL CONFERENCE 2024 - JAN. 17-20

OD/AD SUCCESS GUIDE

As an OD or AD, you should be able to give a quick and concise explanation to students and faculty about what CNSA is (this package is a good start)! You should have an "elevator pitch" or a brief message about who we are, what we do, and what the membership benefits are. Being able to clearly explain your organization is essential when recruiting new students and gaining support from faculty.

ODs and ADs are the liaison between the BOD and the students, and the students are our strength! Therefore, it is important that you disseminate the information passed along to you to the rest of your student body.

Send an email to your Regional Director introducing yourself and send monthly reports on your chapter school. Tell us all the great things you're doing! Regional Directors are your greatest resource for support and information, and they are here to facilitate your chapter's success!

Create a CNSA bulletin board at your school in an area where all students will be able to see. Add CNSA information, meeting times, conference dates, and contact information. You can also include information on CNSA benefits and pictures of NNSW, CNSA events, conferences, etc.

Create a CNSA Facebook page for your chapter and showcase the activities that your group is involved in. Use your page as a chance to share/connect with other chapter schools to get ideas. Ensure you keep the pictures and information posters onto your page unbiased and professional. Make it a goal that every student in your chapter engages with the official CNSA page, knows about the committee pages, and your own chapter's Facebook!

CNSA is a member-driven organization, and it is important to us that our members are actively engaged and involved in CNSA-led initiatives. Make sure you know your students by name. CNSA is a community and knowing your community members demonstrates your commitment and leadership to your chapter school and its members.

OD/AD SUCCESS GUIDE (CONT'D)

Get involved with an orientation at the beginning of each year for new students and showcase your leadership as a CNSA representative. Use this time to educate students on the importance of student involvement and advocacy at the local, regional, and national levels.

Go around to classes and tell students about the scholarships, research contests, committees, and the many other opportunities that CNSA offers so that every student can find a passion!

Collaborate with other nursing student groups on campus to plan and host events and seminars. Many CNSA members are a part of multiple groups across campus, there is no need to pick and choose! Utilize the strengths of each group for success.

Hold regular meetings at your school and make meetings open to all students. Give advance notice of the time/date/location and create an agenda beforehand.

Gaining faculty support is central to a successful and thriving CNSA chapter school. Schedule a meeting with your Dean and work together to determine how you help facilitate positive student-faculty relationships. Attend faculty meetings and have an info-session to educate your faculty on CNSA and how they can best support your goals. Demonstrate all of the wonderful leadership opportunities available through CNSA and discuss the potential of using CNSA work in a committee or through advocating as a project for a class.

Let's get as much student representation at our regional and national conferences! Familiarize yourself with all the financial resources that your school offers to help students attend conferences. Connect with your faculty, student union on campus, local partners and businesses to explore sponsorship opportunities. CNSA has a Sponsorship Policy that can be found on the website so be sure you have read and adhered to it.

OD/AD SUCCESS GUIDE (CONT'D)

Here are some ideas that other schools have done in the past:

 Contact partners in your area (nursing colleges, unions, and associations) and introduce yourself. Attend partner meetings and encourage a collaborative relationship. Your Regional Directors frequently share upcoming partner events via social media and email so contact them if you have any questions.

Prepare yourself for the National Assembly by reading through our governing documents (Policies & Procedures, Rules and Regulations, Bylaws, and Strategic Plan). All publications can be found on the CNSA website. Be sure to review the National Assembly Package that will be provided to you as this contains the agenda and all the items to be discussed. A good resource to use during the conference is the Quick Guide to Bourinot's Rules of Orders that is included in this package. Most importantly, ensure that all your students know about position and resolutions statements (they can submit their own!), the national team opportunity, call for abstracts for conferences, the scholarly showcase, as well as all the details about the conference!
